The first one was to Slowhawk Performance in Bridgewater, MA. We drove down for a day of looking at some amazing LS engines, with nary a stock engine in sight. It was a great day of chatting with car folks about their rides, and watching cars put up incredible numbers on the dyno. Some of those runs you could actually feel the vibrations in your chest as the cars spun up to full RPM.

The following week, Butch and I stopped in at New England Corvette Rentals for an open house at their new location. Enjoyed a nice breakfast, grabbed a free T-Shirt, and chatted with folks about the cars. Mike recently got a super nice looking blue C7 Z06 which required some checking out. Then we were on our way down to SMG Motoring to hook up with his Dodge Shelby club at their dyno day. This time, I decided 'what the heck' an put "BUHBYE" on the dyno so that I could get some "before" numbers – as I'm hoping to possibly have some work done on it later this year. I was really curious what the 427 would put down to the wheel bone stock. I was quite pleased with the results – my 2nd run put down 456 HP with 432 Torque. MOD THAT VETTE

My next upgrade to BUHBYE finally arrived, and went on the car this weekend. I had already received the tinted side markers & colored LED lights from Corvette Mods as a birthday gift – but had been waiting on my tinted rear Eagle Eye taillights to arrive from JW Motoring. Figured I'd rather only have to remove the rear lights once, and I'd do them both at the same time.

I grabbed my boxes and went out to the garage for what I hoped would be a quick install. I spent a few minutes with Google looking for tips on how to do the install as the bare bones instructions provided by the seller leave a lot to be desired for someone like me.

I pulled out my trusty Torx-15 screwdriver (the #1 must-have tool for working on a C6, from my experience so far) and set to work on the rear left light. Once you remove the screw, just pull the light forward and then lift a bit, and the light just comes right out. Once the light was out, I could reach through the hole and reach in behind the rear side marker to squeeze the pinch clip that holds in onto the side of the car.

Once the tail light has been removed from the car, it's just a quick quarter turn to release the plastic assembly from the light electrics. Once the outside most lights were out, I reached inside along the side wall of the car to pinch the plastic clip keeping the side marker in place, and out it came. I did the same quick twist to remove the reflector part from the light electrics. Then just a light pull on the bulb to pop it out, and a quick push to insert the new LED light. Remember to turn on your lights to test the polarity – if you install it 'upside down', the LEDs won't come on. Then just twist the light back into the new smoked side marker, and then push it into place back through the holes.

Because the new side markers are smoked very dark, I couldn't just leave the white bulb that was there, as it would no longer be the correct red or yellow colors (rear vs. front) required. So I purchased colored LEDs with the kit that would make it light up the right color.

With the side marker all set, to replace each tail light was fairly simple as well, once you figure what connects to what. First was realizing that the "left" vs "right" tail lights, matter. Thankfully they were labeled on the housing. Reaching into the new light housing, you pull out the 2 connectors you needed to work with. Once connects from the tail light to the resistor to help prevent hyper-flashing that can occur with LEDs without one. The two just snapped together very easily.

Then you just need to pull the bulb out of the lighting electrics on the car, and the new light just plugs right into where the bulb used to slot in. Once all connected, you can pull the red cover off the double sided sticky tape on the resistor, and stick it to the inside of the car frame behind the light opening. Once fastened, just twist the light housing back onto the new tail light, place the light back into the hole, and replace the one T-15 screw to get everything back in place!

At this point, I had done both rear sides, and the 4 tail lights, and it had all gone flawlessly. Now, I just needed to get to the front side markers – which I had thought might be difficult. To get to the marker, you have to turn the wheel all the way to one side, so you can have easy access to the inside wheel liner. While some of the C6s have newer pin type connectors, apparently the 427 uses 5 T-15 screws to hold that liner on, making it a breeze to quickly remove them. Then reaching inside along the front fender, pinch the clip to get it to release from the car, like the rear lights.

Once all set (and test the light to verify the polarity), just screw the 5 T-15 screws back into place, and presto - you're set! The entire thing didn't take more than maybe a hour as I took my time taking some pictures, listening to music, etc. This was a very easy mod to perform for anyone who likes the look. We'll see what mods I look into next!
